One hundred years of ringing at Warfield

The centenary of ringing at Warfield coincided with the 300th anniversary of the burial of Fabian Stedman. The first peal in the tower was Stedman Triples on 10th November 1913. The ringer of the third in the original peal was John Rance, Grandfather of Sue Davenport (nee Rance).

The family decided they would like to mark the occasion with a quarter peal of Stedman Triples which was arranged for 7th December. A further generation of this ringing family was represented by Elizabeth O'Brien, she rang the bell her Great Grandfather rang in the first peal.

The following week a peal of Stedman Caters was rung to celebrate the occasion (details on back page). We would like to thank the Clergy and ringers at Warfield for their assistance in making this possible.

He was well known for his compositions and books on ringing, especially his favourite method, Stedman.

He was a keen ringing teacher, especially of youngsters, and was the conductor for a surprise major hand bell band.

Originally from the Market Harborough area, he spent many years as a ringer at Washington Cathedral. An obituary will be published in the Ringing World soon.

Democracy Rules – OK

For some years there have been volunteers and the same people have been re-elected to the same offices on the nod. This year some don't wish to continue so we need some new blood. At the same time it might be beneficial to move around some of the jobs, in order to get the best overall team to run the Branch.

How does this affect you?

First, think about what the Branch should be doing for its members (you and me) and the sort of people who we ought to elect to make it happen.

Second, find out about the jobs that the Branch officers do.

Thirdly, think who you know (including yourself) who would be suitable for one or more of the jobs.

Finally, discuss it with the person you would like to propose, or who you would like to propose you.

Then come to the AGM and watch democracy in action, so we can all look forward to an active Branch that supports and helps to develop all its members.

Posts where the current officer either wishes to stand down or is due for a change are: Chairman, Ringing Master, and Training Officer, but if you could contribute in another role, maybe the current holder would be happy for an opportunity to move to a different seat, so why not discuss it with him/her. Brrr! Fancy ringing here?



I wonder how many towers there are where the poor old ringers fulfil their duties in a space open to the elements? The congregation is warmer than most as there is no internal tower arch to funnel their warmth away. What is more there is no west door. To be fair, there is a grille beneath the west window in this rather surprising non-porch - a token gesture to keep the ringers warm, but effective? To add to the ringers' woes, there is a very steep wooden ladder-staircase leading to the silence chamber, and further stout ladders in and around the bell chamber and up to the tower roof. When my dear friend Tony dropped his screwdriver, it was I who grovelled around beneath the bells to retrieve it. Alas I didn't have the camera with me for this part of the adventure, as I couldn't have managed it safely.

The church is Cotton, St Andrew in Suffolk (north of Stowmarket), and you may be relieved to know that according to the Diocesan Guild, the bells are not to be rung. There are eight bells, six in their medieval frame and two additional bells in a steel frame attached above the old timber one. Tony is an inspecting surveyor of churches and for my own personal CPD I accompanied him on his quinquennial inspection of this fabulous East Anglian church, where a key concern of the bell ringers is the stability of the medieval frame - hence the screwdriver.

Tony's advice to the parish was to obtain a structural engineer's survey in order to establish what might need to be done.

The church appears to have been built all of a piece in the 14th century apart from the Perpendicular clerestory added in the late 15th century, perhaps at the expense of the de la Pole family (you may recall them from the 2011 outing to Ewelme). Between the upper level windows are heraldic devices including the cross of St. John in fine flush work, while the earlier work has many rich decorative details, including niches for statues on both the tower and the chancel. Internally the church is fairly plain with only a little medieval glass left and almost no monuments. However it does have a spectacular pseudo-hammerbeam roof. Well worth a detour if you are in the vicinity.
