Facebook Advertising at Arborfield


Arborfield Church Bell Ringers have had a [Facebook page](#) since mid-2016, when their [website](#) was launched. Adding a Facebook page was something of an experiment which apparently hadn't paid off; no-one found the page by chance, and the only people who "liked" the page were a handful of other ringers and members of the congregation at Arborfield.

This all changed in November, when I received, out of the blue, an email from Facebook (opposite). I wasn't going to look a gift horse in the mouth, so I set about creating a general, recruitment-styled post (see below right) to use on Facebook to apply this credit to.

When applying the credit, I was able to target those I wanted to see a "Sponsored Post" (you may be familiar with this if you use Facebook). I could have made this visible to anyone anywhere in the world, but instead, I chose to restrict the post to only those who lived within 3 kilometres of Arborfield Church. The post is seen by roughly the same number of people regardless of the restrictions you apply. The promotion ran for 7 days.

During the following week, the enquiries started coming in. Facebook told me it was seen by 817 people directly because of the promotion. Views from other people and since the promotion ended means it has now been seen by 974 people.

I wasn't intending to hold a taster session, I just said that in the post. But in the event, we needed to hold one, to which 6 people attended (5 from the Facebook page, and 1 other person from another source).

In Summary, because of our Facebook advert, we have had:

- 2 people who exchanged messages on Facebook, but haven't come along yet (maybe after Christmas ...)
- 3 people who came to the taster session, but haven't been since
- 2 people who came to the taster session, and have since been to a practice (but were unavailable for the next two)
- 1 person who couldn't come to the taster session, but has since been to two practices (and previously rang as a child)

We had three other child learners join us in September and October, so we are somewhat learner-heavy at the moment so we will not be planning any more recruitment for a while!

For those towers who have no learners and are interested in recruiting, assuming someone in your tower has a Facebook account, get them to create a page for your bell tower. If you are lucky like us, maybe Facebook will eventually bung you some free credit. But having said that, just £15 got us 8 contacts, so you may feel it is worth buying a listing. I am certain that this is more likely to succeed than putting posters up on noticeboards these days, being as everyone now walks around looking at their phones! A change at Waltham St. Lawrence

After twenty-one years as Tower Captain here at WStL, I am delighted to say that I have passed the position/baton/keys/ropes over to Jacquie Hazell, who has run our practices for many months and has been our Tower Captain, in all but name, during that time.

I took over from Anne Yates, who had rung here for 50 years, in 1997, when she and Michael Morley moved to Ventnor on the Isle of Wight. We had a party to honour her many achievements, which culminated in raising the considerable sum of money needed to get the bells re-hung in a steel frame, replacing the previous wooden one. The work was done by Taylors of Loughborough. My only problem that evening at the party was that I forgot to step back with all the other ringers as Anne said, as all good treble ringers do, "Look to ... She's going ... She's gone" with which she passed the keys to me, and here they've been these twenty-one years.

During those years ringers have come and gone but we have managed to keep the bells ringing here. That ringing is now solely due, as in many towers, to the help and assistance of people living outside our own parish.

Over the years our ringers have numbered a vicars wife, a publican, someone who painted the whole of the inside of the church (yes, every square inch of it), engineers, a mathematician, computer wizards, a physiotherapist, and gardeners to name but a few. If we could get all six bells ringing Rounds and Call Changes each Sunday, I would be more than happy. It is having all the bells ringing that we long for, not complex methods.

Small that we are as a band, the one thing that I am most grateful for, in addition to the unstinting help from ringers from elsewhere in the Sonning Deanery, is that we have remained, as under Anne before me, an essentially happy band, which I am sure will continue under Jacquie Hazell's guidance.

Words from Wargrave: a Ringing Master's reflection of the last 12 months



Practices have continued to be well supported, not only by the Wargrave ringers themselves but also by a number of regular and very much appreciated visitors, mainly from other towers in the Loddon Hub. Sundays we, more often than not, ring all eight bells with the Wargrave band, and our ability to ring call changes and strike the bells has been steadily improving.



Two new recruits, who started at the end of 2017, have been making excellent progress. Sally rang her first rounds on Jan 3rd, passed level 1 of Learning the Ropes the following week, and level 2 three weeks later. 'A' levels had to take precedence over ringing, but come the summer Sally was ringing the tenor behind to QPs and mastering the treble to plain methods by the time she went to University in October.



Imogen (age 12) attained level 1 in August; she had been ringing rounds and call changes on eight since March, but ringing our bells up just needed her to grow a little more. Level 2 followed in November and Imogen has rung for her first wedding. She has attended Young Ringer practices, and did extremely well at a Bucks and Berks competition band practice at Twyford, ringing call changes on 8 in every touch of the evening, making huge progress, and holding her own amongst much older and more experienced ringers.

Anne-Marie Adams was presented with a well-deserved Level 2 pass in January, and is progressing through her Level 3 targets. We were delighted that she rang her first QP, tenor behind to doubles, on the centenary of the armistice (see photo on Armistice anniversary page), and treble to minor will soon follow I'm sure.

The rest of the regular band are very supportive, helping ensure that we ring the bells on Sunday, practice and special occasions, and that the less experienced make progress; this is too short to mention each and every one, but they are what makes the Wargrave band and practice what it is, and why it is a pleasure to run the ringing.

John Coombes does a brilliant job of organising and managing the tower and keeping us all in order. He has ensured the village continues to know about, and appreciate its bells, arranging open tower events, visits for scouts, rainbows and brownies, and putting articles in the village news. In June he arranged for the foundry to inspect the bells, and apart from tightening up the nuts holding the tenor on its headstock, which considerably improved its "go", no seriously urgent major work was found to be needed. Some work was recommended, which should improve the overall handling of the bells, and we plan to go ahead with this early in 2019.

In September Imogen's friend Tabitha started to learn, and then Tabitha's Dad, Robbie. It has been a bit of a challenge to maintain frequent and regular practices for them, but Tabitha is developing a nice handling style, and found that ringing up and down on the dumb bell at Shiplake was far more possible than on the treble at Wargrave!

The visit to the pub after practice on the first Wednesday of the month has continued to be a regular feature, and practice night has seen us ring Cambridge Major and Stedman Triples, but if we don't quite have enough for the eight then Stedman Doubles and various Surprise Minor. Call changes, Grandsire, Plain Bob and other strange methods and exercises that I happen to think of also feature regularly. Some, like the 2nd ringing Bristol front work, just don't have names. The more experienced ringers have had to become very adept at fitting around the learners during some of the teaching exercises!

As well as running the ringing at Wargrave, I've had three wonderful trips to Ypres, the first two for intensive training of the fledgling band, and the last with three other Loddon Hub ringers, when we ran a workshop for two of the locals, joined their practice night, and took a load of spare stays as Ash is hard to source in Belgium. I then joined the leper band for their first outing to Kent, a learning curve for them so steep as to be vertical!

Overall the Wargrave band is flourishing, and it has been great to see the progress especially over the last two or three years. Like all ringers and bands we have our ups and downs and some days just nothing goes right for anyone. That is soon countered when someone "gets it" and does really well. Even if we are short of numbers we will find something that we can do, and that helps overall progress. Most of all we try to have as much fun as possible and not to eat too many chocolates. So thank you Wargrave ringers, and all our wonderful visitors; keep coming and we will have a load more fun!
