## Chairman's message



Our Churches are now back in 'Ordinary time' (the period between Pentecost and Advent with no major liturgical events) and the ringing community also seems to be back into more ordinary time after the upheavals of Covid, Royal funeral and Coronation, along with attendant wild swings of optimism, pessimism, lost members, recruitment opportunities and extra ringing.
It would be tempting for us to heave a sigh of relief and drop back into the comfortable rut that we were in before. But we can't because it isn't the same rut - however much we would like to get back to 'normal' some things have changed. We've lost more ringers than we've gained, overall, and people have learnt to balance their lives in different ways that don't always prioritise ringing. They might be small changes but if your band is near a critical threshold they can have a big impact, going from 'just enough' to 'not quite enough'.
The phrase 'new normal' is a century old but it's become much more common lately. We need to adapt to the changes around us by finding ways to do things so we can create a better new normal, and avoid being pushed into a normal that might be new but isn't better. On page 3 I look at one aspect of change within the Branch the cancellation of practices.
The media frenzy over Ring for the King was in full flood when I wrote in the Spring. It generated lots of enquiries about learning to ring, and now the dust has settled it would be good to take stock of how well we did from it. How many of the enquiries were from suitable recruits (with a realistic impression of what ringing entailed)? Did we give them a good initial experience and effective teaching? If not, what stopped us doing so? And looking forward, if a similar opportunity arose again how would we respond? And would we wish for others (media, Central Council, Guild/Branch) to do things differently in future to make it easier for us? Please let us have your thoughts and experiences.
On pages 3 and 4, Rob has analysed the ringing that we did to Ring for the King within the Branch, and I'm sure all of you who took part are pleased to have contributed to the National celebration of the event.
It's always pleasing to see ringers making progress. We've had first peals for two of our young ringers, James from Arborfield and Becki from Sonning, and we also helped Julie, Jan and Jennifer to ring their first quarters. It was good to see them feature in the ART magazine Tower Talk. It is also good to see several of our young members ringing with their peers in neighbouring branches, and taking part in national and regional competitions.
As we enter the holiday season, don't forget to check if there is any ringing where you are staying. You will always be welcome, but if some of their own ringers are on holiday then you would be doubly welcome, and your contribution could make a big difference.

Our Friday evening practices, jointly with Barkham, continue to grow. Including enthusiastic attendance by the Shuttleworth family from Sonning, we have recently had up to 17 attendees. Including semi-absent students and yet another youth learner, we have a total of 23 people on our books. After a recent practice, we had our monthly social in the pub garden at the Bull at Barkham.

Unfortunately, Barkham's bells have been unringable since the Spring due to bird ingress and some extreme nest making in amongst the bells! We hope to be able to remove the detritus at the end of the summer as we now have enough people to ring simultaneously at both Sunday morning services.

## Cancellation of Practices

Looking for patterns in what is otherwise routine detail can sometimes be interesting.
When we introduced midweek daytime practices in 2006 we didn't know how much support there would be so we sent out invitations and only confirmed the practice when we knew there would be enough people present. Occasionally we had to cancel, which avoided anyone turning up and being disappointed. We did the same when we introduced Surprise practices, and more recently Elementary practices. The diary on the website initially shows 'provisional' and then either 'confirmed' or 'cancelled' for each such event.
Those labels are still on the website so we can compare what happened to practices in different years. With the current interest in the impact of Covid I looked at 2019, 2020 and the first half of 2023. I looked at weekday practices, Surprise/Advanced practices and Elementary practices. I didn't look at Youth practices where other factors were different between the years and I didn't look at Saturday practices, where we don't use the same system
In 2019 under $10 \%$ of practices were cancelled ( 2 out of 25 planned) but in $202228 \%$ were cancelled ( 13 out of 46 planned). In the first half of 2023 the figure is $16 \%$ (4 out of 25 planned). That looks as if we are getting back towards pre-pandemic levels, but the overall figures don't tell the whole story. All of the cancellations in 2023 were Advanced practices (4 out of 6 planned) whereas only 1 was cancelled in 2019. That's a significant change to a key element of the mix of practices we provide. We need to understand the factors behind it.
